## College-Wide

Total enrollment by headcount (HC) at Harrisburg Area Community College (HACC) increased for the sixth consecutive fall term to a total of 18,082 students. This was an increase of 7.0% over the 2005 figure (N = 16,899). Full-time (FT) enrollment grew by 5.0% (2006 HC = 6,967 vs. 2005 HC = 6,634) while part-time (PT) registrations rose by 8.3% (2006 = 11,115 vs. 2005 = 10,265). These higher figures for 2006 are also reflected in the 9.4% rise in total applications (2006 = 9,110 vs. 2005 = 8,238). While total HC enrollment was 7.0% higher, the full-time equivalent (FTE) figure went from 11,638.8 in 2005 to 12,447.4 for 2006. This represents a 6.9% increase from one fall term to another.

Females continued to constitute nearly two in three (65.8% in 2006 vs. 65.5% in 2005) of all HACC students, as their overall number was up by 8.8% (2006 = 11,899 vs. 2005 = 11,067) while the male population increased by 7.0% (2006 = 6,183 vs. 2005 = 5,832).

HACC continued to attract a growing number of minority students as their absolute numbers went from 2,856 in 2005 to 3,146 this year (10.2%). Hispanic enrollment was especially strong as their total increased by 14.4% (2006 = 979 vs. 2005 = 856) while African Americans were 8.7% higher (2006 = 1,576 vs. 2005 = 1,450). Even American Indians were 40.0% higher (2006 = 56 vs. 2005 = 40) though their absolute total remains fairly small. The number of Asian students experienced a more moderate growth of 4.9% (2006 = 535 vs. 2005 = 510).

By curriculum type, career/technical majors remained the most frequently selected option as more than three in five (62.9%) favored these programs. This proportion was similar to 2005 (63.4%) as were the percentages in transfer majors (2006 = 4,976 or 27.5% vs. 2005 = 4,864 or 28.8%) and those selecting General Studies (2006 = 1,730 or 9.6% vs. 2005 = 1,318 or 7.8%). The most popular career majors were the two nursing programs (RN and PN) and Business Management while the Business Administration, Elementary Education, and Criminal Justice programs drew the most transfer students.

Following past practice, this report will highlight the four campuses approved by the PA Department of Education (PDE). In addition to these locations, profiles for the Virtual Campus and York Center can be found in the appendices. Due to PDE requirements, a "home campus" code was employed to assign Virtual and York students to one of the four approved sites.

#### Harrisburg Campus

The Harrisburg Campus saw a rise in total HC of 2.8% from fall to fall (2006 = 9,767 vs. 2005 = 9,505). This modest increase can be attributed to a 2.6% increase in FT enrollment (2006 = 4,085 vs. 2005 = 3,980) and a nearly identical 2.8% growth in PT HC (2006 = 5,682 vs. 2005 = 5,525). The corresponding FTE figure was 3.1% higher in 2006 (6,873.8) when compared to 2005 (6,665.1).

About three in five (N = 6,000 or 61.4%) Harrisburg students were females, a percentage that mirrored the 2005 figure (61.6%). By ethnicity/race, the African American population was the largest minority group (N = 1,077), but the Hispanic population grew the fastest (2006 = 352 vs. 2005 = 324 or 8.6%). The number of Asians actually declined by 2.3% (2006 = 336; 2005 = 344) and the American Indian group went from 5 to 7 students (40.0% higher). Total minority representation was 18.4% of the total (N = 1,793), matching the 18.3% (N = 1,756) 2005 fall term number.

Turning to the program type, a large majority (60.0%) selected a career/technical major while three in ten (29.6%) opted for one of the transfer options. One in ten was completing the General Studies requirements. The most popular career programs were nursing (RN and PN), Business Management, and Dental Hygiene. Business Administration and Elementary Education were the largest transfer majors.

#### **Gettysburg Campus**

Overall enrollment at the Gettysburg Campus continues to be strong as the HC total rose 10.2% (2006 = 1,644 vs. 2005 = 1,492). The PT population constituted most of this growth with a 12.7% increase (2006 = 1,107 vs. 2005 = 982) while FT HC was up 5.3% (2006 = 537 vs. 2005 = 510). The higher proportion of PT enrollment is reflected in the 9.8% rise in FTE (2006 = 1,085 vs. 2005 = 988.5) compared to the 10.2% rate for HC enrollment.

Females comprised nearly three in four (N = 1,208 or 73.5%) of all Gettysburg students. This adhered to past patterns as Gettysburg historically has registered the highest proportion of females of any of the campuses. Total minority enrollment grew by 15.4% (2006 = 120 vs. 2005 = 104) with African Americans up by 18.2% and Hispanics 11.5% higher than the previous fall term. The minority student population was 7.3% of the total and while this was the lowest of any campus, it reflected the small minority base in Adams County.

More than two in three (68.8%) Gettysburg students selected a career/technical program as their academic major, which was the highest rate of any location. Transfer majors constituted 23.1% of the total while the remainder (8.2%) were General Studies students. The RN program was the most popular career major, followed by Early Childhood Education and the LPN curriculum. Like Harrisburg, Business Administration and Elementary Education topped the transfer list.

#### Lancaster Campus

Enrollment growth at the Lancaster Campus was the highest of any location as total HC was 15.4% higher than the previous fall term (2006 = 5,588 vs. 2005 = 4,842). Much of the increase can be attributed to both the York location and the Virtual Campus which currently are not official PDE sites. Later in this report a review of York and Virtual will be completed.

The FT population was up by 11.7% (2006 = 1,976 vs. 2005 = 1,769) with the PT segment rising a much higher 17.5% (2006 = 3,612 vs. 2005 = 3,073). Compared to the 15.4% rise in HC, the FTE total was only 9.8% higher. This was due to the greater increase in PT HC compared to the FT total.

More than seven in ten (71.1%) of Lancaster students were females, a percentage similar to the 2005 figure (69.0%). Similar to the other locations, the Lancaster Campus remains a strong draw for females, but it has found it far more difficult to recruit and retain male students.

The minority population constituted 18.8% of the total (17.8% in 2005) and overall it grew by 22.0% (2006 = 1,049 vs. 2005 = 860). African Americans were up by 23.2% (2006 = 414 vs. 2005 = 336), followed by Asians at 20.6% (2006 = 164 vs. 2005 = 136), and Hispanics at 19.8% (2006 = 453 vs. 2005 = 378).

Similar to the outcomes at Harrisburg and Gettysburg, nearly two in three (65.8%) Lancaster students entered a career/technical major. One-quarter (24.9%) selected the transfer option and one-tenth (9.3%) were completing General Studies.

On an individual basis, the nursing (RN and PN) majors were the two largest career programs while Business Administration and Elementary Education were the most popular transfer selections. Neither of these findings varied greatly from the 2005 results.

#### Lebanon Campus

Growth at the Lebanon Campus was the slowest of the four locations as the total HC increased by 2.2% (2006 = 1,083 vs. 2005 = 1,060). The number of FT students decreased by 1.6% (2006 = 369 vs. 2005 = 375) but the 4.2% rise in PT HC (2006 = 714 vs. 2005 = 685) made the total increase possible. Overall FTE was up by 2.1% (2006 = 710.9 vs. 2005 = 696.6).

Two in three (66.4%) Lebanon students are females, matching the same figure from the previous fall (66.8% in 2005). Total minority enrollment grew by 17.9% (2006 = 184 vs. 2005 = 156). Indeed, the increased number of minority students accounted for all of the fall HC growth. The number of African Americans rose by 27.8% (2006 = 46 vs. 2005 = 36) and the Hispanic population was 13.7% higher (2006 = 116 vs. 2005 = 102). Interestingly, total White HC dropped by 0.4% (2006 = 891 vs. 2005 = 895).

Reflecting all other locations, Lebanon students were more likely to select a career/technical program (62.2%) than a transfer major (29.0%). About one in twelve (8.8%) were in General Studies. The most popular career programs were nursing (RN) and Business Studies while Elementary Education and Business Administration were the transfer leaders.

# Summary

The Fall 2006 enrollment at HACC continued to grow and established new highs for total FT and PT enrollment. However, among the official PDE campuses, the growth was not evenly apportioned. Both the Gettysburg and Lancaster Campuses expanded at double digit rates but growth at Harrisburg and Lebanon were far more modest. Overall, PT (up 8.3%) exceeded the growth found in the FT (5.0%) population. This resulted in an FTE rise of 6.9% versus a 7.0% HC growth.

Females continue to make up the large majority of students both college-wide and at each campus. Also, a record number of minorities enrolled and they now comprise more than one in six HACC students (17.4%). Of particular note is the large gains made by Hispanics (14.4% increase).

Finally, career/technical majors remained the program of choice for more than three in five (62.9%) students. On an individual basis, the two nursing majors (RN and PN) now enroll nearly one out of every five (3,573/18,089 or 19.8%) HACC students.

#### Appendices Summary

#### A. Virtual Campus

The Virtual Campus continued to expand rapidly as 3,243 students (2005 = 2,688) enrolled for at least one internet or video course. This represents an increase of 20.6%. The 3,243 virtual

students generated 4,873 registrations (2005 = 4,375 or 11.4% higher) and 14,410 credits (2005 = 13,007 credits or 10.8%). More than nine in ten registrations (91.5%) and credits (91.2%) were associated with online courses as the Virtual Campus moves to discontinue all video courses by 2008.

Demographically, seven in ten (73.5%) Virtual students were females while minorities comprised 12.3% (N = 392) of the population. This varied little from the 2005 totals when females were 71.7% of the total and minority students 13.6%. The mean age of a virtual student came to 28.6 years.

As the largest campus, Harrisburg had more than half (56.4%) of the virtual enrollment. This was followed by Lancaster (28.5%), Gettysburg (9.0%), and the Lebanon Campus (6.1%). The number of students enrolled only in a virtual course (or courses) was 32.0% or 1,038. The total was slightly below the 2005 percentage of 32.2% (866/2,688). From these figures, it is clear that a majority of students employ virtual courses as a means to augment their traditional course schedule. A majority of the virtual-only students were from the Harrisburg Campus (N = 638 or 61.5%) followed by the Lancaster enrollment (N = 253 or 24.4%). A total of 254 Virtual Campus courses were offered in the Fall 2006 term. This represents a 54.9% increase from the 164 courses available in Fall 2005.

Dauphin County residents (N = 754) were the largest group of virtual by HC followed by York (N = 604) and then Lancaster (N = 599). In 2005, Dauphin again was the largest, with Lancaster and Cumberland County following. By school district, Central Dauphin (N = 253) remained the largest with West Shore (N = 129) next in size.

The most popular career programs were nursing (RN; N = 590) and Business Studies (N = 98), while Business Administration (N = 213) and Elementary Education (N = 140) had the most transfer majors. Finally, the number of new applicants to the Virtual Campus rose from 426 in 2005 to 571 in 2006 or 34.0%. In all aspects covered by this report, the enrollment numbers for the VC were strong.

# B. York Center

The York Center was characterized by another year of exceptional enrollment growth as the total HC rose 43.3% (2006 = 1,332 vs. 2005 = 929). The number of FT students more than doubled with a rise of 115.8% (2006 = 503 vs. 2005 = 233) while the PT population was up 21.1% (2006 = 829 vs. 2005 = 696). The enrollment increase resulted in 3,431 course registrations producing 10,529 credits. The registration total was up 47.1% (2005 = 2,333) while the credit hour production gained 55.1% (2005 = 6,788 credits).

More than three in four (77.6%) of all York students were females, a continuation of the finding from the previous year (75.8% females). Minority enrollment constituted 15.7% of the total (N = 206) with African Americans (N = 138) and Hispanics (N = 48) comprising the two largest groups. In 2005, minorities made up 14.3% of all York students. The mean age of the York Center population was 27.2 years, changing little from the last fall term (2005 = 27.1 years).

The career program option in nursing (RN) enrolled the most students (N = 436) with the PN major following (N = 64). When transfer majors were considered, the two most popular were Business Administration (N = 68) and Criminal Justice (N = 64). Not surprisingly, the vast majority (95%) of York students resided in York County.

Enrollment at the York Center showed strong increases for the Fall 2006 semester. This was especially true among the FT student group and those selecting a career major. Minority student numbers also expanded, albeit at a rate less than the FT student count.

The rapid expansion of the York Center clearly confirmed the desire of many in the county to avail themselves of the higher educational opportunity provided by HACC. The potential for continued growth is very good given the population base, expanded facility, and added programming options.

#### C. Summary

The audited Fall 2006 enrollment results for both the Virtual Campus and York Center were very encouraging. Both experienced double digit increases and both remain the fastest growing segment of all locations.

At the VC, most students have selected online courses to augment their current courses which are offered in a traditional classroom format. Fewer than one-third (30.4%) of all VC students are enrolled only in virtual courses. Besides this factor, it is important to point out that the ongoing, rapid increases in VC registration are conditioned by the number of instructors willing to teach and be trained in an online environment. In nearly all courses, especially those meeting a "core" requirement, the demand for online instruction exceeds the supply currently available. Continued expansion of the VC is expected.

Enrollment at the York Center is characterized by students who would enroll primarily at the Lancaster Campus (and to a lesser extent Gettysburg and Virtual) if the site had not been established and those who enrolled because the location meets their needs. Over the past several years the numbers coming to York strongly suggests that a need is being met and many residents have elected to take advantage of this expanded educational opportunity. With a large population base, projected growth shows that the York Center may eventually become the third largest HACC campus in terms of enrollment after Harrisburg and Lancaster.

The Fall 2006 totals for the Virtual Campus and York Center played a vital role in generating the increased HC found college-wide. This role is expected to continue for the near future.
