## Harrisburg Area Community College Fall 2007 Student Profile

## College-Wide

Overall enrollment at Harrisburg Area Community College (HACC) grew for the seventh consecutive fall semester, as the student headcount (HC) increased by 4.2\% (2006 total = 18,082 vs. 2007 total $=18,840$ ). The number of part-time (PT) students grew by a fairly robust $6.2 \%(2006=11,114$ vs. $2007=11,800)$ compared to a modest $1 \%$ increase in the full-time (FT) population (2006 = 6,967 vs. $2007=7,040$ ). The larger percentage increase of PT students compared to the FT population resulted in a $3.7 \%$ full time equivalent (FTE) total increase compared to the previous fall term ( $2006=12,447.4 \mathrm{vs} .2007=12,914.0$ ).

A majority of students again were comprised of females ( $65.3 \%$ of total, or 12,301 ) as this group continued its two-to-one ratio when compared to their male peers. However, the male population was $5.8 \%$ higher ( $2006=6,183$ vs. $2007=6,539$ ) compared to a $3.6 \%$ increase in females (2006 = 11,899).

Totals by ethnicity/race varied from group to group. Hispanic students showed the highest increase at $10.7 \%$ ( $2006=979$ vs. $2007=1,084$ ), followed by African Americans at $5.8 \%$ (2006 $=1,576$ vs. $2007=1,668)$, Whites at $3.9 \%(2006=14,245$ vs. $2007=14,797)$, and then Asians at $3.4 \%(2006=535$ vs. $2007=553)$. The American Indian population decreased by $3.6 \%$, but their total HC has historically been very small ( $2006=56$ vs. $2007=54$ ).

The distribution by academic major will sort out College in High School (CHS) totals for the first time. Also, those who are undecided, guests, or returning graduates have been placed in the General Studies category rather than in career programs, as was the case in recent years. (Note: The 7661 General Studies - Undecided major was added this past year for the first time.)

Given the above, a majority of students continued to select one of the career/technical major (52.8\%) while just over a quarter enrolled in one of the transfer programs (27.0\%). Both categories held steady from the previous fall term in terms of proportional representation but the actual number of career/technical majors grew by $5.1 \%(2006=9,469 \mathrm{vs} .2007=9,952)$ compared to an increase of $2.4 \%$ for transfer students ( $2006=4,976$ vs. $2007=5,094$ ). The total number of CHS students went from 677 in 2006 to 706 (4.3\%) but this did not alter their share of the total HC (3.7\%) from year to year.

The most popular career programs were the two nursing majors (RN and LPN) and Business Management, with Business Administration, Elementary Education, and Criminal Justice topping the transfer selection. These did not vary greatly from the 2006 fall term.

Following past practice, all audited data are sorted by the four approved PA Department of Education (PDE) campuses. These include Harrisburg, Gettysburg, Lancaster, and Lebanon. For internal use, enrollment profiles from both the York Center and Virtual Campus are reviewed following the four approved PDE campuses, and supporting data can be found in the appendices.

## Harrisburg Campus

The Harrisburg Campus enrollment figures were essentially flat, given the 0.1\% increase (2006 $=9.767$ vs. $2007=9,774$ ) when matched to the previous fall term. Unlike the college-wide total, which experienced a small increase in FT students, the Harrisburg Campus FT population fell by $5.5 \%$ (2006 = 4,085 vs. $2007=3,862$ ). This was offset by a $4.0 \%$ growth in PT HC (2006 =

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5,682 vs. $2007=5,912$ ). Given that the growth was associated with the PT population and not the FT segment, this resulted in a decline of $0.9 \%$ in FTE (2006 = 6,873.8 vs. $2007=6,815.0$ ) Somewhat unexpectedly, males increased their proportionate share of the Harrisburg HC, as they grew from $38.6 \%$ of the total to $39.3 \%$. This was achieved by a rise of $2.1 \%$ (2006 = 3,767 vs. $2007=3,845$ ) at the same time the female total declined by 1.2\% (2006 = 6,000 vs. $2007=$ 5,929 ). Historically, females have constituted three of every five Harrisburg students.

While the Hispanic student total increased by a strong 9.1\% (2006 = 352 vs. 2007 = 384), smaller gains were registered by both African Americans (1.6\% or $2006=1,077$ vs. $2007=$ $1,094)$ and Asians ( $1.5 \%$ or $2006=336$ vs. $2007=341$ ). Counts for Whites fell slightly ( $-0.2 \%$ ) from fall to fall (2006=7,565 vs. $2007=7,552$ ), as was the case for the small American Indian population ( $-10.7 \%$ or $2006=28$ vs. $2007=25$ ).

Career programs remained the most popular, with a $1.1 \%$ increase (2006 = 5,112 vs. $2007=$ 5,218 ), while General Studies held steady at $0.4 \%$ (2006 = 1,623 vs. $2007=1,630$ ). Conversely, transfer students fell by $3.3 \%(2006=2,893$ vs. $2007=2,798$ ), and the CHS population was down by $7.9 \%$ ( $2006=139$ vs. $2007=128$ ). The RN (nursing) program remained the largest career program, followed by LPN, Dental Hygiene, and Business Management. For the transfer option, Business Administration, Criminal Justice, and Elementary Education were the leaders.

## Gettysburg Campus

After expanding rapidly for the past six years, growth slowed to $1.2 \%$ this term (2006 = 1,644 vs. 2007 = 1,663). Both FT and PT enrollment were very steady, with the FT HC up 1.3\% (2006 = 537 vs. $2007=544$ ) and the PT total $1.1 \%$ higher ( $2006=1,107$ vs. $2007=1,119$ ). This resulted in a $1.6 \%$ increase in FTE $(2006=1,085.0$ vs. $2007=1,102.3)$.

The number of male students grew by $3.7 \%(2006=436$ vs. $2007=452)$ compared to the $0.2 \%$ rate associated with their female peers ( $2006=1,208$ vs. $2007=1,211$ ). Even with a higher percentage increase, males continued to represent only about one in four (27.2\%) of all Gettysburg students.

Minority enrollment grew rapidly, with 10.3\% more African Americans (2006 = 39 vs. $2007=43$ ), $25.0 \%$ more Asians (2006 = 16 vs. $2007=20$ ), and $6.9 \%$ more Hispanics ( $2006=58$ vs. $2007=$ 62). The White population held steady at $0.8 \%$ ( $2006=1,479$ vs. $2007=1,491$ ). Even with the strong minority increases, the ratio of Whites to the campus total generally remained at nine in ten, a proportion that has changed little over the past few years (2006 = 90.0\% or 1,479/1,644 vs. $2007=89.7 \%$ or $1,491 / 1,663$ ). American Indians comprised fewer than ten students (2006 = 7 vs. $2007=8$ ) and have never enrolled in significant numbers.

Career programs were selected by more than half of the students (55.0\%), as the total number increased by $2.7 \%$. Fewer than one in four (22.4\%) were in transfer majors (a decline of 1.8\%), while General Studies had $15.7 \%$ of the total. The number of CHS students experienced a drop of $26.3 \%(2006=156 \mathrm{vs} .2007=115)$ and this decline certainly played an important role in affecting total HC .

By major, both nursing programs (RN and LPN) were the top choice of career students, followed by Business Management. Among transfer programs, the most popular were Business Administration, Elementary Education, and Criminal Justice.

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## Lancaster Campus

Enrollment figures for the Lancaster Campus rose by 13.3\% (2006 = 5,588 vs. $2007=6,333$ ). It is important to note that most students attending the York Center are part of the Lancaster Campus total. The growth was split evenly between FT and PT students. For the former, an increase of $13.3 \%$ was achieved ( $2006=1,976$ vs. $2007=2,239$ ) and the same percentage was also computed for the latter (13.3\%). As a result, total FTE rose by the exact 13.3\% (2006 = $3,777.8$ vs. $2007=4,279.5$ ).

The number of males registering at the Lancaster Campus rose by 17.4\% (2006 = 1,616 vs. $2007=1,897$ ) compared to a $11.7 \%$ increase for females ( $2006=3,972$ vs. $2007=4,436$ ). Nevertheless, females continued to make up seven in ten ( $70.0 \%$ or $4,436 / 6,333$ ) of all Lancaster HC. This percentage was slightly down from the previous year (71.1\%).

African American HC was up by $17.6 \%$ (2006 = 414 vs. $2007=487$ ), with the Hispanic total also rising a healthy $14.8 \%(2006=453$ vs. $2007=520)$. This was followed by a $13.2 \%$ increase in White student HC (2006 = 4,310 vs. $2007=4,878)$ and a modest $3.7 \%$ growth in the Asian population ( $2006=164$ vs. $2007=170$ ). The American Indian total was up $5.6 \%$, but their overall numbers were quite small ( $206=18$ vs. $2007=19$ ). It is encouraging to see that more than one in six $(2006=18.8 \%$ vs. $2007=18.9 \%)$ students at the Lancaster and York locations are minorities (Hispanic, African American, Asian, and American Indian) as this campus provides needed educational services to these communities.

The career vs. transfer program distribution closely mirrored what was found at Harrisburg and Gettysburg. More than half selected a career major (52.8\%), with the two nursing (RN and LPN) and the college-based Radiologic Tech programs the most popular. About one in four students were in one of the transfer curricula (25.3\%), which again enrolled the largest group in Business Administration, Elementary Education, and Criminal Justice. Unlike the Gettysburg Campus, which experienced a decline, the CHS program rose by $38.7 \%(2006=266$ vs. $2007=369$ ). Clearly CHS was an important source of new students.

## Lebanon Campus

Of the four PDE approved campuses, only Lebanon had fewer students than the year before. The total HC was $1.2 \%$ lower compared to the previous fall term ( $2006=1,083$ vs. $2007=$ 1,070 ). A $7.0 \%$ rise in FT enrollment ( $2006=369 \mathrm{vs} .2007=395$ ) was unable to ameliorate the $5.5 \%$ decline in PT registration (2006 = 714 vs. $2007=675$ ). However, due to the higher credits carried per student by those enrolled FT, the FTE total rose by $0.9 \%$ (2006 = 710.9 vs. $2007=$ 717.2).

The loss of PT students was also reflected in the 5.2\% drop in male enrollment (2006 = 364 vs. $2007=345$ ). The female count was a fairly steady $0.8 \%$ higher ( $2006=719 \mathrm{vs} .2007=725$ ), as they constituted two out of every three (67.8\%) students.

About one in six $(17.4 \%$ or $186 / 1,070)$ students was a minority, with the highest percentage growth (15.8\%) associated with Asians (2006 = 19 vs. $2007=22$ ). The largest minority group was the Hispanic population, as it rose $1.7 \%$ (2006 = 116 vs. $2007=118$ ). Both the White $(-1.7 \%$ or $2006=891$ vs. $2007=876$ ) and African American HC ( $-4.3 \%$ or $2006=46$ vs. $2007=$ 44) populations fell while only two American Indians matriculated to the Lebanon Campus

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Not only was this the only location to experience a decline in total HC from the previous fall, but its program distribution also differed. Whereas a majority at the other campuses selected a career major, under half (44.2\%) did so at the Lebanon Campus. The RN (Nursing) program was the most popular, followed by Business Studies and Early Childhood Education. The Lebanon Campus registered the largest proportion of transfer majors (30.2\%) while the numbers in General Studies (16.1\%) nearly reflected the percentages at the other locations. Elementary Education was the top transfer major, with Business Administration (top choice at the other three locations) and Criminal Justice following.

## Summary

In summary, while overall enrollment was fairly healthy, totals varied greatly from location to location. Student HC increases remained strong at the Lancaster Campus (including the York location), slowing at both Harrisburg and Gettysburg, and actually declining in Lebanon.
Females continued to hold dominate the college-wide enrollment total and HACC remains a college of choice for over 3,300 minority students ( $N=3,359$ or $17.8 \%$ ). Finally, a majority of HACC students selected career/technical majors while the transfer option is the choice of about one in four. The CHS program expanded to over 700 students, but its growth was slower (3.7\%) and uneven when campus location was considered.

## Appendices Summary

Prior to considering the York Center and Virtual Campus data, it should be noted that total HC figures are duplicated. A number of students at these locations are enrolled in two or more campuses/centers, but are counted for either York or Virtual if at least one of their courses are taken there. Since they are not approved PDE sites, there is no regulation governing the counting of a single student at multiple locations. This is not the case for the four approved locations, as a home campus code is assigned to each individual and an unduplicated count is arrived at.

## A. Virtual Campus

Enrollment in the Virtual Campus (VC) was up by 13.1\% compared to the previous fall term (2006 = 3,243 vs. $2007=3,667$ ). The total HC was comprised of an $11.9 \%$ increase in FT HC ( $2006=1,119$ vs. $2007=1,252$ ) and a $13.7 \%$ rise in PT HC ( $2006=2,124$ vs. $2007=2,415$ ). These students generated 16,998 credit hours (versus 14,410 for Fall 2006, or an increase of $18.0 \%$ ) based on 5,708 registrations (versus 4,873 for Fall 2006, or 17.1\%). Only a small portion of the VC credits came from the vide courses (600/16,998 or $3.5 \%$ ), as this option is scheduled to end in 2008. Only 11 video courses were offered in the Fall 2007 term.

Females constituted nearly three-quarters of all enrollment (72.6\% or 2,662/3,667), which closely mirrored the Fall 2006 findings ( $73.5 \%$ or $2,384 / 3,243$ ). Overall, male enrollment grew by $17.0 \%$ (2006 = 859 vs. $2007=1,005$ ) compared to an $11.7 \%$ increase associated with their female peers ( $2006=2,384$ vs. $2007=2,662$ ).

The number of minorities grew by 15.1\% over the previous fall term (2006 = 398 vs. $2007=$ 458) as one in eight VC students were either African American, American Indian, Asian, or Hispanic (12.5\% or 458/3,677). The Asian HC was $40.0 \%$ higher (2006 = 59 vs. $2007=82$ ) while African American HC was up $12.7 \%$ (2006 = 223 vs. $2007=251$ ) and Hispanics grew by $4.5 \%$ (2006 = 110 vs. 2007 = 115). By comparison, the White HC experienced a $13.3 \%$ increase (2006 = 2,730 vs. $2007=3,094$ ).

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A review of the student registration pattern found that $35.2 \%(1,291 / 3,667)$ of all VC students were enrolled solely in VC courses. This was an increase over the Fall 2006 percentage ( $32.0 \%$ or $1,038 / 3,243$ ), but it confirms once again that a large majority of VC students had a "mixed" schedule that included traditional and online (also video) courses.

Dauphin County enrolled the most VC students ( $\mathrm{N}=762$ ), followed by Lancaster ( $\mathrm{N}=680$ ) and then York County ( $\mathrm{N}=629$ ). By school district, Central Dauphin had the largest HC total ( $\mathrm{N}=$ 261). The most popular majors for VC students were the RN program ( $\mathrm{N}=650$ ), General Studies ( $\mathrm{N}=520$ ), and Business Administration ( $\mathrm{N}=250$ ).

## B. York Center

Enrollment at the York Center continued its strong growth, as the number of students grew by $37.5 \%$ (2006 = 1,332 vs. $2007=1,831$ ). The number of FT students increased by 42.7\% (206 = 503 vs. $2007=718$ ), with PT HC up $25.5 \%$ ( $2006=829$ vs. $2007=1,113$ ). The total credit hours generated by the York Center was $31.1 \%$ higher than the previous fall term (2006 = 10,529 credits vs. $2007=13,807$ credits), which was the result of a $38.7 \%$ increase in registration ( $2006=3,431$ vs. $2007=4,742$ ).

By gender, females made up nearly three in four ( $73.4 \%$ or $1,344 / 1,831$ ) of all York Center students. This was down from their Fall 2006 proportion when females were $77.6 \%$ of the total HC (1,034/1,332). Overall, female HC was $30.0 \%$ higher from fall to fall ( $2006=1,034$ vs. 2007 $=1,344)$ while male HC was $63.4 \%$ higher $(2006=298$ vs. $2007=487)$.

The York Center was the school of choice for a growing minority population, as their total grew by $44.5 \%(2006=209$ vs. $2007=302)$. Hispanics registered the highest percentage increase at $64.6 \%(2006=48$ vs. $2007=79)$, followed by African Americans at 44.9\% (2006=138 vs. 2007 $=200)$. By comparison, the White population grew at a $34.0 \%$ rate $(2006=1,087$ vs. $2007=$ 1,457).

Other points of interest found that the vast majority ( $91.8 \%$ or $1,668 / 1,831$ ) of York Center students reside in York County, and that York City was the home to the largest contingent when school districts were considered ( $\mathrm{N}=242$ ). By academic major, the RN program was the most popular ( $N=537$ ), followed by General Studies $(N=276)$ and then Business Administration ( N $=86)$.

## C. Summary

Perhaps the most telling result of the Virtual Campus and York Center enrollment is the continued strong growth experienced by both. The York Center, with a large population base to tap, will likely become HACC's third largest location once campus status is approved by PDE. Growth is projected to continue for the next 3-5 years, though at a lower rate. This location certainly has fulfilled a need in the county and enhanced the educational opportunities of its residents.

The picture for the VC, while remaining bright, will likely be one of challenge and change. This is especially true as it relates to course and program expansion and securing qualified instructors. Growth has been very strong and promising with college-wide requirements and core courses (e.g. English Composition I, General Psychology, Humanities) and less so with program-specific classes. Thus, the VC must attempt to navigate between securing the proper mix of courses

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and providing an ever growing number of qualified instructors for them. Nevertheless, based on the Fall 2007 data in which growth in the VC continued unabated, the future remains very promising.
