College-Wide

Overall enrollment at Harrisburg Area Community College (HACC) increased in the Fall 2009 by 13.3% compared to the previous fall term. Total head count (HC) was 22,529 (vs. 19,886 in 2008) as both the full-time (FT) and part-time (PT) population groups grew. For FT students, a strong 17.9% increase was registered (2009=8,838 FT students vs. 2008=7,498) while the PT population was 10.5% higher (2009=13,691 vs. 2008=12,388). Corresponding to the greater growth experienced by the FT population, overall full-time enrollment (FTE) rose by 14.9% over the previous fall (2009=15,649.5 FTE vs. 2008=13,624.7 FTE).

Females continued to comprise a large majority of the HC with 63.5% of the total (N=14,305). This was 10.2% higher than Fall 2008 (N=12,982). While still much smaller, the male population increased by 19.1% (2009=8,224 vs. 2008=6,904). With this growth, the proportion of males grew to 36.5% of the total, up from 34.7% the previous fall.

Adoption of the new ethnicity/race format in which ethnicity is reported separately from race resulted in new baselines being established and no comparison data reported. The largest racial minority group was African Americans (N=2,406 or 10.7%) followed by Asians (N=750 or 3.3%), students of mixed race (N=276 or 1.2%), American Indians/Native Alaskans (N=219 or 1.0%), and then Hawaiian/Pacific Islanders (N=204 or 0.9%). In regards to ethnicity, only Hispanics will be reported. This adheres to the U.S. Government standard set forth in the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) which HACC participates in. A total of 1,797 students (8.0%) identified themselves as Hispanic and this figure includes all races.

A majority of HACC students (N=11,517 or 51.1%) selected a career/technical program major while just over a quarter (N=6,082 or 27.0%) enrolled in a transfer curriculum. General Studies students constituted one in six (N=3,658 or 16.2%). These findings did not significantly change from the 2008 totals. Interestingly, the number in the College in the High School (CHS) program rose from 861 students in 2008 to 1,272 for the present term. This represents a 47.7% increase while the overall proportion was 5.6% of the total HC (vs. 4.3% the previous year).

Specific career and transfer programs that were popular in 2008 did not change for 2009. The Registered Nursing (RN) major, followed by the Licensed Practical Nursing (LPN) and Business

Management were the largest career programs (by enrollment). On the transfer side, Business Administration, Elementary Education, and Criminal Justice registered the most students.

In summary, HACC continued to show strong enrollment growth college-wide for the ninth consecutive fall term. All five PDE approved campuses experienced an increase with the number of FT students exceeding the proportional growth of their PT peers. Females and career/technical majors remained a majority while new baselines were established for the race and ethnicity distribution.

Harrisburg Campus

The Harrisburg Campus enrolled a record number of students as total HC was 9.7% higher (2009=9,699) and campus FTE up 11.1% (2009=7,571.0 vs. 2008=6,816.3). The Harrisburg enrollment rose 12.0% (2009=4,458 vs. 2008=3,981) for FT students and 8.1% (2009=6,184 vs. 2008=5,718) for the PT population.

By gender, the Harrisburg Campus had the highest proportion of males (N=4,421 or 41.5%) of any location. African Americans made up the largest racial minority group (N=1,384 or 13.0%) with Asians the next largest (N=426 or 4.0%). A total of 5.5% (N=585) identified themselves as ethnic Hispanics.

Similar to the college-wide results, a majority (52.3%) of students selected a career major while more than one in four (28.2%) were in a transfer program. Harrisburg was not as dependent on CHS enrollment as it comprised less than half (2.2%) of the percentage found college-wide. However, with a small base (2008=157), the CHS population was up by 46.5% (2009=230).

On a program enrollment basis, the RN and LPN were the two most popular career majors followed by Business Management. Business Administration, Criminal Justice, and Elementary Education enrolled the most transfer students.

Except for the enrollment increase, the demographic traits remained fairly stable. The CHS program did grow rapidly but with fewer students to begin with, its rapid rise did not have as pronounced an impact on total campus enrollment when matched to other locations.

Gettysburg Campus

The total HC at the Gettysburg Campus was dramatically up by 27.9% (2009=2,173 vs. 2008=1,699) as FT enrollment rose 29.5% (2009=698 vs. 2008=539) with the PT population 27.2% (2009=1,475 vs. 2008=1,160) higher. This growth translated to a rise of 26.2% (2009=1,407.3 vs. 2008=1,115.4) in FTE.

Nearly seven in ten (N=1,516 or 69.8%) students at Gettysburg were females, an expected percentage given the totals in recent years. Not surprisingly, taking into account the Adams county demographics, only a small percentage of students were from one of the racial minority groups. African Americans were the largest minority group (N=65 or 3.0%) while more than doubled this proportion were identified as Hispanics (N=136 or 6.3%) when ethnicity was considered.

An important change was uncovered when program selection was compared to the college-wide results. Fewer than half (N=1,034 or 47.6%) of the students selected a career technical major and just over one in five (N=470 or 21.6%) were in transfer programs. These two figures were significantly below the college totals and this can be attributed directly to the numbers associated with the CHS program. The 7.7% (130/1,699) CHS percentage more than doubled in 2009 (16.6% or 360/2,173) as the Gettysburg Campus actively sought a rapid expansion of this program. Currently, about one in six of all Gettysburg students are in the CHS program compared to one in thirteen (130/1,699 or 7.7%) a year ago.

The RN and LPN programs plus Business Management enrolled the most career students while Business Administration, Elementary Education, and Criminal Justice topped the transfer category. None of these findings varied greatly from those in Fall 2008.

Strong enrollment growth was associated with the Gettysburg Campus as new highs were established in both FT and PT enrollment. Of particular note was the more than doubling of the CHS population.

Lancaster Campus

Total HC increases at the Lancaster Campus were below the college-wide figure but it was still up by 9.2% (2009=5,406 vs. 2008=4,952). Enrollment growth of FT students was higher (2009=2,006 vs. 2008=1,714 or 17.0%) than their PT counterparts (2009=3,400 vs. 2008=3,238 or 5.0%) while campus FTE was up 12.4% (2009=3,712.0 vs. 2008=3,301.8).

Mirroring results from recent years, nearly two-thirds (N=3,617 or 66.9%) of all Lancaster students were females. Similar to the other campuses, African Americans were the largest racial minority (N=458 or 8.4%) with Asians following (N=214 or 4.0%). In terms of the Hispanic ethnicity category, Lancaster Campus had both the largest group (N=672) and the highest percentage total (12.3%).

The career/ transfer distribution changed little from the previous year. Just under half (N=2,656 or 49.1%) selected a career program, a figure that matched last years number (49.3%). Likewise, the transfer program results, just over one in four (N=1,523 or 28.2%), did not deviate greatly from 2008 (27.6%). Unlike Gettysburg, the CHS population, while growing by 15.3% (2009=385 vs. 2008=334), comprised 7.1% of the 2009 compared to 6.7% (334/4,952) in 2008. The Lancaster Campus is not as dependent as other locations on the CHS enrollment.

While the RN program remained the largest of all career programs, the next in line wasn't the LPN major but Radiologic Tech. The LPN total was the third most popular. Not surprisingly Business Administration, Elementary Education, and Criminal Justice enrolled the most transfer students.

The enrollment growth at the Lancaster Campus fell below the college-wide total but it remained a robust 9.2%. The FT student population was the leader while a smaller percentage increase was registered for PT students. Females continued to comprise a large share of the HC and the highest absolute number and proportion of Hispanics were associated with this location. Reliance on the CHS program enrollment was far less than at other campuses.

Lebanon Campus

The Lebanon Campus grew by 7.3% (2009=1,362 vs. 2008=1,269) compared to the previous fall. This was the smallest increase among the five locations and nearly all of it was attributed to the FT population (2009=509 vs. 2008=420 or 21.2%) as only marginal growth was associated to the PT students (2009=853 vs. 2008=849 or 0.5%). The FTE total was up by 9.7% (2009=889.7 vs. 2008=811.2).

The number of male students grew by 12.8% (2009=519 vs. 2008=460) surpassing the female rate of 4.2% (2009=843 vs. 2008=809). This meant that males increased their share of the total HC to 38.1% (2008=36.2%). For the race question, African Americans were the largest group (N=66 or 4.8%) with American Indians in second (N=20 or 1.5%). More than one in five (N=307 or 22.5%) did not respond to the race question. The Hispanic total was just over one in ten (N=153 or 11.2%) of all students.

One of the most important factors that the data revealed was the continued reliance of the Lebanon Campus on the CHS program. Nearly one in five (N=259 or 19.0%) students were drawn from this option, a percentage similar to the previous year (18.9%). With such a high CHS rate, both the career (N=590 or 43.3%) and transfer (N=312 or 22.9%) options were well below the college-wide average. Given that nearly all CHS students are enrolled in a single course, it is clear that this program had a significant impact on the small increase associated with the PT population.

The most popular career programs were RN, Business Studies, and LPN while Elementary Education, Business Administration, and Criminal Justice lead the transfer majors. This did not produce any radical changes from the past year.

Even with its 7.3% increase, perhaps the most telling point of the Lebanon Campus enrollment was its ongoing reliance on the CHS program. This was similar to the proportion associated with the Gettysburg Campus. Females retained a majority of those enrolled by males had a higher growth rate. Finally, while African Americans made up the largest racial minority, they were overshadowed by the larger Hispanic total.

York Campus

As the newest campus, York continued to make substantial increases in all areas of student enrollment. Overall, HC was up 30.0% (2009=2,946 vs. 2008=2,267), the highest percentage found college-wide. Both the FT (2009=1,167 vs. 2008=844 or 38.3%) and PT totals (2009=1,779 vs. 2008=1,423 or 25.0%) reflected this strong trend. Total campus FTE was 31.0% higher (2009=2,069.6 vs. 2008=1,580.0).

The highest proportion of females (2,108/2,946 or 71.6%) was found at the York Campus. By race, African Americans was well represented, comprising one in seven (N=434 or 14.7%) students. When ethnicity was considered, Hispanics made up 8.5% (N=251) of the total HC.

Reflecting on the college-wide results, a majority (N=1,667 or 56.6%) selected a career/technical major while a quarter (N=781 or 26.5%) were in transfer programs. As a new location, the CHS program was only at its early start up stage and did not greatly impact on total HC (N=38 or 1.3%).

Similar to the other locations, Business Administration, Criminal Justice, and Elementary Education were the most popular transfer majors. For career programs, York again mirrored the other campuses as the RN and LPN majors had the highest enrollment numbers followed by Business Management.

In summary, the York Campus continued to rapidly expand as the student enrollment nears 3,000. With a large population base to draw from, the growth at the York Campus is very similar to what the Lancaster Campus experienced. The current challenge of finding sufficient space is now as great as the recruitment and retention of students. Additionally, the CHS program is in its early stages and may provide a ready and growing source of students in the near future.

Summary

Overall growth remained strong both college-wide and on a campus by campus basis. Somewhat unexpectedly, FT enrollment was the leader in the enrollment uptick. The amount of growth did, however, vary greatly from campus to campus when the large increase at York was matched to the more modest expansion at Lancaster and Lebanon.

Females continued to comprise a large majority of the enrollment but the male population had a larger percentage increase which expanded their proportion of the total HC. The new ethnicity/race report format did not allow for year to year comparisons. Suffice it to say that African Americans were the largest minority group and students who identify themselves as Hispanics constitute nearly one in twelve of the college-wide population.

As in the past, a majority of students continued to select a career/technical program as their major (RN is the largest) while just over one in four were enrolled in a transfer (Business Administration is the largest) curriculum. Perhaps one of the telling results is the rapid growth of the CHS program, now numbering nearly 1,300 students. At some campuses, especially Lebanon and Gettysburg, this segment represents a significant portion of their enrollment and ramifications associated with this growth, especially financial, must be taken into consideration for both college-wide and individual campus master planning.

Appendix – Virtual Campus

The Virtual Campus is not a PDE approved entity but an internal college-wide administrative unit responsible primarily for distance learning, especially as it applies to HACC's online courses. For PDE reporting purposes, all students enrolled in an online course are assigned to one of the five "home" or approved campuses. Thus, the totals discussed in this section are duplicated members from the five other campuses.

New highs were established as they applied to the number of students who enrolled in as least one online course, the total number of registrations, and the total number of credit hours generated. For student HC, 4,942 students selected at least one online course. This represents a 16.5% increase from the Fall 2008 term (N=4,242). The number of students taking an online course(s) and enrolled FT was 1,816 (2008=1,437 or up 26.4%) while 3,126 were enrolled on a PT basis (2008=2,805 or 11.4%).

The 4,942 online students produced 7,981 course registrations, an increase of 19.2% (N=6,698) over the previous year. The course registrations resulted in 23,404 credits or 17.8% more than the 2008 total (N=19,851).

Females made up nearly seven out of every ten (3,421/4,942 or 69.2%) online students. However, this was proportionally less than last year's (3,139-4,242 or 74.0%) total. Again, no comparisons were completed for ethnicity/race due to the new reporting format. The data showed that African Americans were the largest minority group (N=398 or 8.1%) while the proportion of Hispanics was 5.5% (N=274).

While 4,942 students enrolled in at least one online course, only a third (1,593/4,942 or 32.2%) were registered solely for the web based option. Clearly, the large majority were "mixed", selecting both the online and the traditional classroom instructional format.

The largest contingent of online students were residents of York County (N=1,074) followed by Dauphin (N=975), and Lancaster (N=937). By program, Business Administration (N=339) was the most popular transfer program while pre RN (N=902) enrolled the most career students.

In closing, the Virtual Campus remained a vital and growing concern, offering ever more courses and enrolling a record number of students. These online courses have expanded both the educational option and schedule flexibility that many at HACC feel better meet their needs.
