An Update from our Facilities Supervisor

Welcome back to campus!

Your facilities staff had a very busy summer. Our custodial section deep-cleaned all of the restrooms and administrative offices as well as the common areas on campus. They also stripped and waxed all of the classroom floors and the hallways. Completing this work takes a lot of time and a delicate balance, since we have to schedule the work around summer classes, normal administrative functions and outside organizations using our multi-purpose room.

The maintenance section completed a conversion of room 302 into a new presentation room. The room received new paint, window blinds, ceiling tile, wall base and LED light fixtures.

With this renovation, for the first time on our campus, we used new lighting control technology that actually "harvests" natural sunlight. This technology automatically adjusts the controls to dim or increase the light levels of the LED light fixture's brightness depending on the availability of the natural sunlight outside. We also worked with the IT department to install a new "smart" white board and short-throw projector in the room.

Faculty Participate in Campus Day Event

The Fall 2018 Campus Day was held on Wednesday, Aug. 22, and was based on the theme, "Teaching in Today's Changing World." The potluck dinner, presentations, and discussions allowed faculty and staff to continue to develop a sense of community while also working to address tangible needs of our students. Participants discussed some of the challenges associated with working in a rapidly evolving field and how their personal learning networks can help them navigate these challenges. In looking to support students, faculty and staff discussed ways to ensure that basic needs from Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs (physiological, safety, and sense of belonging) are met through programs such as the

Giving Pantry, KEYS, Public Safety and Security, developing an engaging campus and classroom environment, and community resources.

In order to ensure that students are performing at their best, we must strive to identify and eliminate any possible life hardships or barriers to success. This reality was addressed through a presentation by the Sexual Assault Resource & Counseling Center (SARCC) in how to develop Trauma-Informed Classrooms. Key instructional strategies were presented to faculty in order to ensure a safe learning environment for all students. SARCC will return to the Lebanon campus through their partnership with the Campus CITE Committee and present further trainings on topics such as #MeToo in College Classrooms.

Clery Act Annual Security Report

HACC, Central Pennsylvania's Community College, is required by the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act (20 USC § 1092(f)) to publish an annual security report by Oct. 1 of each calendar year. This report contains three years of campus crime statistics for incidents that occurred on a HACC campus, in unobstructed public areas immediately adjacent to or running through a campus and at certain non-campus facilities owned or controlled by the College.

Also included in the report are policy and procedure disclosures for emergency response, the reporting of crime, investigative and disciplinary procedures for rape, sexual assault/misconduct and drug and alcohol control, among others.
