GET THE MOST OUT OF ACADEMIC ADVISING!

Here are some helpful tips to prepare for your appointment to see your assigned Counselor or Advisor:

Print a Degree Evaluation.

What is a Degree Evaluation?— a computer analysis of your progress towards a certificate or degree. It is a record of the courses you have taken, how they fit into your chosen program of study, and includes other information such as your current GPA and courses you may have transferred in from other college or universities.

- ⇒ You can run a Degree Evaluation from the Student Tab in MyHACC.
 Click on "Degree Evaluation" in the "Student Success" box under "Advising and Counseling".
 Follow the prompts, then select "Generate New Evaluation." Select "Student Degree Evaluation Results" on the display options page to print the Degree Evaluation.
- ⇒ If you are considering changing your major, you can run a Degree Evaluation to see how the courses you have taken will fit into the new major. You will still run a Degree Evaluation as explained above, but instead of selecting "Generate New Evaluation," you will select "What-If Analysis." From there, you will use the pre-selected entry term, then select the new major, the campus you want to attend, and use the "Add More" button if the new major has additional concentrations (applies to Criminal Justice, CIS, Hospitality Management, Communications, and Web). Then you can print the Degree Evaluation for the new major by selecting "Student Degree Evaluation Results."

If you have any questions about running the Degree Evaluation, please come to 221 Main and ask one of the friendly people at the front desk for assistance.

Why Placement Testing?

Some students think that placement testing is part of the admission decision process for HACC. It is not. The simple truth is that HACC is an open admissions college which means that everyone who applies is accepted - with very few exceptions. Open admissions is part of the Pennsylvania Code, the rules that dictate how HACC and the other thirteen PA community colleges operate.

Some colleges require an attainment of certain SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test) scores, letters of recommendation, interviews and/or other requirements in order to be admitted. These colleges are considered selective admissions colleges because they only accept certain students that meet their criteria. Due to selective admissions, these colleges' student body is more homogeneous in that their students will possess similar reading, writing and math abilities. For instance, Harvard University, a highly selective college, has students who generally earned 700 or above in their critical reading, writing and math scores on the SAT.

As an open enrollment college, HACC does not require SAT scores, letters of recommendations, interviews, etc. As a result, in some ways HACC has more diversely-skilled students than a selective admissions college. Some students are high school drop-outs while others have recently completed high school or their GED's. Others have been raising children and/or working and have been out of school for a few or many years prior to coming to HACC. Still others have taken a course or two at another college or vocational program prior to starting HACC. Consequently, skill levels differ significantly.

With this multitude of backgrounds, HACC's task is to help students be successful by grouping students with similar reading, writing and math skills in these classes so that they can increase their skills. *Placement testing is the method used to determine current skill level*. Without placement tests, students might take courses that were too easy for them or, on the other hand, too hard. For instance, a student who never had algebra in high school would most likely find college algebra too difficult, just as a student who had pre-calculus in high school would most likely find beginning algebra too easy. Providing instruction at the right level in order for the student to increase his/her skill level is the aim. Students who have questions about their placement test results should consult their counselor/advisor.


Is Math Learning Impossible?

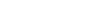

3 Most Common Cover Letter Mistakes And Tips on Crafting an Effective Cover Letter

A cover letter is a short business letter that should accompany your resume and serve as an introduction to it. Each time you send out your resume always include a cover letter to the prospective employer indicating the specific position you are applying to.

Your cover letter should inspire the employer to consider you seriously as an applicant and allow you to show how your skills and abilities will benefit their company. You want to keep your cover letter professional.

Keep in mind the following three common cover letter mistakes and do not repeat! This will increase your chances of not being "screened out" during this job search process.

#1 -- Not addressing letter to a named individual.

Letters addressed to job titles ("Dear Personnel Director") are poorly received, but even more disdained are those old salutations "Dear Sir or Madam" and "To whom it may concern." Best to call the company and find out the name of the individual to whom to write.

#2 -- Failing to be proactive by requesting an interview.

If you want an interview, ask for it. Take the initiative in your letter to ask for the interview, tell the employer in the letter that you will follow up, and make certain you actually do follow up in the time you had indicated.

#3 -- Telling what the company can do for you rather than what you can do for the company.

The employer wants workers who show initiative, can solve problems, and will be productive. Far down on the employer's list of priorities is their concern with helping you gain experience or further develop your skills. You always need to focus on telling the employer how you can contribute to their organization's success.

THE FOLLOWING ARE ADDITIONAL TIPS TO HELP YOUR COVER LETTER DO WHAT IT IS INTENDED TO DO:

- Explain why you are sending a resume don't make the employer guess what you are interested in applying for.
- Tell specifically how you learned about the position or the organization a flyer posted in your career center, a web site, a family friend who works at the organization. It is appropriate to mention the name of someone who suggested that you write, especially if they are a valued employee.
- Convince the reader to look at your resume -The cover letter will be seen first so it must have impact. It must be very well-written and targeted specifically to that employer.
- Call attention to elements of your background education, leadership, skills, experience that are relevant to the position you are seeking. Be as specific as possible, using examples but do not reiterate everything that is in your resume.
- **Reflect your attitude -** personality, motivation, enthusiasm, and communication skills.
- Provide or refer to any information specifically requested in the job advertisement that might not be currently covered in your resume, such as availability date, specific skills being requested or perhaps a request for salary requirements or attaching the requested college transcript or writing sample.
- Indicate what you will do to follow-up –and be certain to follow-up in the time you have indicated.

Finally, please remember to keep copies of everything that you send to aid in your follow-up. The follow-up phone call or email will let the employer know that you are really interested in meeting them and learning more about the position.

TOP FIVE

Interview Mistakes

Interviews can be a daunting experience, especially for those who are not prepared. The more prepared you go into the interview, the more likely you will be able to put your "best foot forward".



As you prepare for your next interview, please keep these common interview mistakes in mind and be certain not to repeat. This will help to ensure a successful interview and one where you will be leaving a positive impression and increasing the likelihood of your chances of getting a call back with a job offer.

#1 - Mishandling First Impressions -

First impressions really do count. Turning up late, not apologizing for lateness, not dressing appropriately, chewing gum, not turning off mobile phones, having a "soggy/weak" handshake, or just a complete lack of social skills are all surprisingly common. This can lead to the interviewer disliking the candidate from the beginning. *Instead*, be polite, business-like, friendly, attentive and appropriate throughout the interview and this will put you in a "good light".

#2 - Poor Preparation-

The interview is about finding the right fit. Make certain you have researched the company and know something about both the company and the position for which you are applying. The employer needs to see your enthusiasm and interest in the position. Plus, remember that you want to make certain that this employment opportunity is a good choice for you too! Be prepared to ask questions about the position to aid in your decision.

#3 - Lying -

"Bending the truth" regarding the reason you left a past job or "claiming more credit" for an achievement than was actually the case is never a good idea. While it may be common for some to exaggerate on resumes, it is wrong to downright lie on them and lying is a "surefire" way of compromising a job offer. Once uncovered, it will damage the candidate's integrity and the further down the line the lie is discovered the greater the consequences become.

#4 – Answering Questions Badly –

This could mean talking for too long—or not long

enough, showing poor listening skills or not asking the interviewer to clarify a specific question. You should know the typical job questions that are asked and come prepared to answer them. Give answers that are on point and lean slightly forward maintaining appropriate eye contact as you respond.

#5 – Leaving the Interview Without Knowing Next Steps –

You need to know what happens next in the process. Asking questions like, "When do you anticipate making a decision?" or "When should I expect to hear from you?" are completely appropriate. Finally, if you are really interested in the position be certain to tell the employer before leaving.
