Celebrating Administrative Professionals Week **April 22-28, 2012**

Administrative Professionals Day is Wednesday, April 25, 2012

The theme for the 2012 Administrative Professionals Day is: "Admins—the pulse of the office".

Administrative Professionals Day/Week was originally organized in 1952 as "National Secretaries Week" by the National Secretaries Association (now known as the International Association of Administrative Professionals or IAAP) in conjunction with public relations executive Harry Klemfuss and a consortium of office product manufacturers. It was established as an effort to recognize secretaries for their contributions in the workplace, and to attract people to secretarial/administrative careers.

The association successfully campaigned U.S. Secretary of Commerce Charles Sawyer to proclaim the first National Secretaries Week on June 1-7, 1952. He designated Wednesday, June 4, as National Secretaries Day. Sawyer, Barrett and Woodbridge participated in ceremonies held in Washington, D.C.

In 1955, the observance date of National Secretaries Week was moved to the last full week of April. The name was changed to Professional Secretaries Week in 1981, and became Administrative Professionals Week in 2000 to encompass the expanding responsibilities and wide-ranging job titles of administrative support staff.

Administrative Professionals Day will mark its 60th anniversary on April 25, 2012. Over those decades, the job of an administrative professional has changed dramatically thanks to new tools, techniques and seismic shifts in the economy and culture itself. But admins have remained the steady center of efficiency through it all, helping ensure that jobs get done right, on time and under budget. Admins are one of the engines of business, particularly in a complex economy. In a world that demands the accurate and speedy movement of digital information, admins are masters of data. And they do this while maintaining their more traditional role as the gatekeepers for many customers, clients and employees. Quite simply, admins are the pulse of the office.

IAAP created National Secretaries Week with two objectives in mind: to recognize "the secretary, upon whose skills, loyalty, and efficiency the functions of business and government offices depend," and to call attention "through favorable publicity, to the tremendous potential of the secretarial career."

Since 1952, IAAP has honored office workers by sponsoring Administrative Professionals Week. Over the years, Administrative Professionals Week has become one of the largest workplace observances. The event is celebrated worldwide, bringing together millions of people for community events, educational seminars and individual corporate activities recognizing support staff.

Today, there are more than 4.1 million secretaries and administrative assistants working in the United States, according to U.S. Department of Labor statistics, and 8.9 million people working in various administrative support roles. More than 475,000 administrative professionals are employed in Canada. Millions more administrative professionals work in offices all over the world.

APW is always the last full week in April. In 2012, Administrative Professionals Week is April 22-28, and Administrative Professionals Day is Wednesday, April 25.





The season is finally starting to cool a bit – we've never experienced such a "don't-blink-or-you'll-miss-it" March, where the forsythia was still blooming when the dogwoods unfurled their flowers.

We're fortunate that so many people in our college community enjoy planting and gardening at home. Here are some of the most common questions we're asked during our work day:

What can I do with my leftover bulb foliage?

There are a few solutions to this dilemma. Bulb foliage needs at least 8 weeks to replenish their flowers for next spring. In order to leave the foliage in place until it withers, plant bulbs in beds with perennials – the emerging perennial plants will hide the floppy bulb leaves. Or, plant early spring bloomers like scilla, anemone blanda (*see picture, above*) and crocus – these bulbs have much less foliage and it dies off quickly. If you're feeling extravagant, treat bulbs (tulips especially) like annuals, and remove the bulbs after the spring show. Braiding, banding, or cutting off bulb foliage prematurely will shorten the life of your spring bulbs. Patience is a virtue, even in the garden!

When can I plant my tomatoes?

Tomatoes, peppers, zucchini, and other summer vegetables need warm soil in order to thrive. If you plant them before the middle of May they will sit, sulk, or even die in the cold wet soil of early spring.

Can I seed grass now?

Spring is a good time to patch lawns and renovate small areas. Because of the vagaries of summer in PA, early fall is the best time to do large scale reseeding and renovations. The warm soil, cool air, and normally plentiful rains of fall are ideal for grass.

What's the best potting soil for containers?

A soilless mix is needed for optimal plant performance in containers. Garden soil and heavy potting mixes compact in containers, squeezing out vital air and creating boggy conditions. Ingredients should include peat moss, composted bark, perlite or vermiculite. Invest in good potting soils and in slow release fertilizers like Osmocote for robust blooms all summer.

How do you get everything to look so nice?

The secrets to our success are 1) pick the right plant for the right place; 2) stagger blooming times so that something interesting is always coming into bloom, and 3) select plants with interesting and colorful foliages that provide texture and color even if nothing is blooming. And, don't forget to interplant evergreens for winter interest.

When can I prune my azaleas/rhododendrons/forsythias etc?

The typical rule is "prune after the bloom" for most plants, so that there is plenty of time for next spring's flower buds to develop. If robust plants like forsythia and lilacs have outgrown their space, they can be cut to almost ground level after blooming. Or, consider removing them and replanting with new cultivars that are more compact and manageable.

Can I have your job?

Only if you still want it in sultry mid-August and during blinding snowstorms in February!



Cod Au Gratin From Isabel Croke, Pearl City, Newfoundland

2 lbs. of cooked codfish fillets (Bring to a boil and cook on medium heat for about 10 minutes. Watch your pot, don't let it boil over or you'll have some mess)

- 3 Tblsp butter
- 3 Tblsp flour
- ½ tsp each salt and pepper
- 2 cups fresh milk
- 11 ½ cups grated cheddar cheese

Drain the cooked fish and flake with a fork. Place in a square baking pan.

Melt the butter in a saucepan. Take off the burner and add the flour, salt and pepper and stir. Add milk and blend in. Put back on the burner on medium high heat, and stir constantly with a whisk until the sauce thickens. Remove from the burner.

Pour the sauce over the fish and mix thoroughly. Add cheese so the entire top of the fish mixture is covered--whatever it takes to cover the top of the dish). Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Let cool about 15 minutes before serving as it has to set a bit.

Marnie Brennan, HACC Theatre Professor, recently received the following communication from West Virginia University Senior Professor Joshua Williamson:

"Over the past several years, we have had many HACC theatre students enter our program as transfers to complete a BFA in Theatre at WVU. Our faculty have been so impressed with the high level of skill and training these students possess that our dean has approved our request to seek an articulation agreement with your program. Ultimately,



we would like to develop a 2+2 plan that would allow HACC theatre students to complete the AA degree in Performing Arts at HACC and then enter WVU as a junior and complete either a BA in Theatre or a BFA in Theatre with a concentration in Acting as part of our Acting Studio Program. This agreement would facilitate a smooth transition to WVU for the student without any worries about what courses may or may not transfer.

If such an agreement is of interest, we would like to plan a visit to HACC to meet your faculty and tour your facilities and perhaps observe a class or a rehearsal as a way of introducing ourselves. Our dean would contact your dean to facilitate getting the necessary approvals from both institutions.

I am hopeful such an agreement would improve enrollment for both programs. Please feel free to email or call me anytime. I'm looking forward to developing a relationship with HACC."



Jobs focusing on today's emerging green technology are among the fastest growing segments in the employment sector. According to the Pennsylvania Green Jobs Survey Report, green jobs are jobs that employ workers in producing or offering products or services that promote energy efficiency, contribute to the sustainable use of resources or renewable energy, prevent pollution, help clean up the environment, and promote the reduction of harmful emissions.

HACC currently offers two academic programs in alternative energy systems for green careerminded students: A two-year program leading to an associate in applied science degree in alternative energy and a shorter, one year certificate in PV solar. All green courses are offered in the evening at our Mid-Town center, 1500 North Third Street. Graduates of the program are general practitioners skilled in design, installation, maintenance, and operation of energy systems; site identification and assessment; structural audits for energy efficiency and conservation; project management; regulatory compliance; and basic economic, environmental, and social impact assessments. These specialized skills are built upon a strong education in math, science, communications, computing, and business. Message from our Interim Vice President

During my recent Harrisburg Campus Forums, there have been questions about what the different areas in Student Affairs do for our students. After spending some time with those who work in each area of Student Affairs, I wanted to share the information below to give all of us a better understanding of those functions.

Student Affairs Operations

Recruitment/Admissions

Recruiters help bring new students to our campus. They provide comprehensive, accurate information and support for prospective students, families, secondary education professionals, employers, and community groups concerning the College, placement testing requirements, credit and non-credit program offerings, financial aid, and tuition payment options. They implement effective communication strategies for reaching new students, working with PR to develop media campaigns. They build relationships with prospective students from an expression of interest until they are admitted, they cover walk-ins in the Welcome Center, they present during campus visit days, they visit high schools in the three-county region, and represent HACC at various events on and off campus.

Financial Aid

Financial aid counselors at HACC help students navigate the maze of financial aid possibilities, from student loans to state and federal grants and potential scholarships. They assist with forms and answer questions about the process.

Welcome Center

Welcome Center staff assist students with a wide range of activities: course registration, drop/add, change of major, paying bills, basics of financial aid, processing admissions at peak periods. They staff the windows on the second floor of Cooper, monitor and assist with the self-service stations, and answer phone calls about registration questions and student accounts. They assist with collections, the no-pay drop process (students who are dropped for not paying their bill), and the payment plan.

Here are some fast facts about activity in the Welcome Center during a typical busy month:

- 3175 student walk-ins at the window
- 5154 students using self-service kiosks
- 5916 phone calls answered; 86% of incoming calls answered
- 3497 cash/credit transactions at the window
- 3401 registration transactions



As a result of the questions about the Welcome Center during the Harrisburg Campus Forums, there will be an information session planned during May for any one who is interested.

Counseling

- 1. Counselors and advisors lead our advising efforts, offering training and tools to faculty advisors. They work regularly with faculty to update them on new developments and have recruited faculty to balance advising loads.
- 2. They have developed and implemented Advising and Registration Sessions (ARS) for all new students to the college.
 - They provide information about financial aid and registration, and time for a brief advising appt with a counselor.
 - They reach groups of students with generic information and 1/1 time is reserved for advising.
 - There's a more concrete result: a larger percentage of students have now logged into HACC web, printed schedule and bill, and have gained experience using our system.
 - More efficient use of time with new students creates more time they can spend with continuing students in 1/1 appointments.
 - Health Careers-specific ARS sessions prepare students for the rigors of these selective admissions programs and the competitive nature of the clinical application.
- 3. **Division Counselors:** Several Harrisburg Campus counselors also serve in the role of division counselors, acting as a liaison between their assigned academic department(s) and the counselors. They provide the students' perspective in curriculum discussions, communicate to campus counselors about program changes and their advising implications, and communicate program changes quickly to students.
- 4. **Training materials:** They provide and update advising check sheets for students and faculty advisors; they update program information (Fact Sheets) and circulate among all the counselors to make sure all are aware of recent changes in case they get student from another program. Cross training occurs all the time, and especially during ARS.

Student Life

Student life helps attract students to the campus and they help retain students once they are here by engaging them beyond the classroom. This results not only in greater retention but higher grades and greater graduation rates. The number of activities and student participation have increased dramatically in the last year, from two activities per month in Fall 2011 to two activities per week in Spring 2012.

Student Life is divided into several categories

- SGA: Governmental Affairs: the voice of student concerns, legislation, allocation of student activity fee, and club recognition and service.
- Student Programming Board: Campus activities (IMPACTS): Intellectual, Multicultural, Personal Awareness, Community Services, Transition/Leadership, and Social.
- VIP: Campus ambassadors: Campus Tours, open houses, High school visits.
- Professional Staff: Community Service, Leadership programs, Campus collaborations.
