MIDTERM GRADES

Faculty teaching full or late start part of term classes this semester can begin entering Midterm Grades on October 2 and 8:00 a.m. The deadline to enter Midterm Grades is at 12:00 noon on October 16. Students will be able to view midterm grades as they are entered by faculty.

14+1 ACADEMIC CALENDAR

The College's transition to an academic calendar in fall and spring semesters featuring 14 weeks of instruction plus a finals week begins in Spring 2015. Classes for spring will begin on Tuesday, January 20. Finals Week will end on Tuesday, May 12.

COURSE AVAILABILITY WEBLINK

The College has set up a mechanism for students to share schedule-related requests with administrators. A weblink is now active on the course schedule search page that students can use to make these requests. Updates from student submissions are shared with campus deans on a weekly basis.

CLASS WAITLISTS

Effective Spring 2015, Lancaster Campus will begin using a new Banner waitlist option for select courses. The feature will allow students to add their names to a waiting list for certain full or pending courses. If a spot opens up, students on the waitlist will be notified via Hawkmail and have 24 hours to register. Waitlist numbers will be monitored by the campus Academic Deans as well to determine if additional classes are needed.

REVERSE TRANSFER AGREEMENT SIGNED WITH MILLERSVILLE UNIVERSITY

This agreement will make it easier for students who've transferred early to Millersville to apply their Millersville credits back toward their HACC associate degree. Millersville will be reaching out to former HACC students who transferred 45 or more credits to Millersville to alert them to this opportunity. We encourage all early transfers to Millersville to look into this as it affords them the opportunity to earn an associate degree on the way to their baccalaureate degree while allowing HACC to improve its graduation rates.

STARFISH

Starfish is a new software tool for retention of students. Faculty can use the system to encourage students, post office hours, and alert staff to potential issues. 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TTS Workshop Descriptions

ADDING CONTENT IN D2L

An important part of a successful online component to your course is content. This session will teach you how to add content to your D2L course shell, organize the course content, create learning modules, and upload and download files.

CLASSROOM CLICKERS

Give your students a voice during class using Turning Technologies clickers for polling. Clicker sets are available for reservation in the library, as well as one set in each faculty bay in East. We will work hands-on with Turning Technologies software to learn the basics of developing polling presentations. We will also cover the process of using them in the classroom.

ENGAGING DISCUSSIONS IN D2L

Engage your students in discussion either before class, after class, or both! Getting students to talk about the day's topic before class can get them interested, and having them reflect afterwards can help in the learning process. We will look at how to develop quality discussions and utilize the discussion tool in D2L.

INTRODUCTION TO PODCASTING

Podcasting is recording either audio or video content that may be accessed anywhere, anytime by your students. One benefit is it allows students to go back and review content for greater understanding. Another benefit is that it can free up time during class for more engaging activities beyond lecture. We will look at Audacity and Camtasia Studio software that will allow you to develop quality podcasts in no time.

VIRTUAL FLASH CARDS

Technology has put a spin on the traditional flash card study method! You and/or your students can develop flashcards that they can then access on a computer, smart phone, or tablet. This is a fantastic way to get students engaged with your content, especially if your subject involves extensive vocabulary. We will look at a free website called Quizlet that offers free iOS and Android apps for mobile use.

WEB 2.0 TOOLS FOR STUDENT PROJECTS

Tired of grading the same old research papers or speeches? Why not empower your students to get creative with their technology skills to build a better project? We will look at several tools that will allow students to create innovative presentations and animations for larger class projects.

Public Safety Tip for October

What You Can Do?

Your involvement is essential to the prevention of crime on campus. Disinterest and complacency are the prime contributors to the success of a crime. The burden of crime prevention rests not only with the security Department but also with each member of the HACC community.

Campus Safety and Security Officers cannot be everywhere at once and are, therefore, dependent upon you to recognize and report incidents of suspicious and criminal activity. The extent of your cooperation will greatly influence security's effectiveness in combating crime. Doing your part means:

- 1. Being aware of your vulnerability to protect yourself and your property.
- 2. Being alert for suspicious or criminal activity and conditions that may represent a hazard to the community.
- 3. Getting involved by becoming more security conscious by reporting all incidents of suspicious and criminal activity, no matter how insignificant, to security immediately.

Remember that unreported crimes cannot be solved, by not reporting the crimes you allow the perpetrators to commit additional and perhaps more serious crimes. Many times crime solving depends upon how accurately and promptly the incident is reported.

It is important that you are able to provide as much of the following information as possible:

- 1. The nature of the incident.
- 2. When and where the incident occurred.
- 3. Number of persons involved (names, sex, race, age, height, hair style/color complexion, distinctive characteristics, i.e. facial features, scars, physical defects, glasses, clothing, etc.).
- 4. Direction and method of travel.
- 5. Vehicles involved (color, type, make, model, license plate number and state, distinctive characteristics, i.e., decals, bumper stickers, damage, number of occupants, etc.).
- 6. Description of stolen property (item, manufacturer, model number, serial number, value, color, dimensions, etc.).
- 7. Any other applicable information.

Remember, safety is everyone's responsibility!
