Student Success Story: Amber Ramsey

Nursing major Amber Ramsey surpassed the challenge in her English Composition II course to identify a local issue and argue for a potential solution by selecting a topic worthy of an awareness campaign that sparked a television news story.

"Tragedy struck our family on April 17th, 2008, one month before my niece, Allison's, second birthday," Amber wrote in her essay. "Allison was playing in the backyard and in the quick moment when my sister looked away, Allison disappeared. After twenty terrifying minutes, Allison was found lying head first in their neighbor's backyard garden pond. She was not breathing and had a very faint pulse. A police officer performed CPR and was able to resuscitate her.

"She spent the next four months at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. My family and I were told that she would probably not be able to walk or talk again due to the lack of oxygen and the effects it had on her brain. Six years later she is now in third grade, learning alongside her peers, walking, running, talking, playing and making everyone around her smile."

In her essay, Amber cited the World Health Organization, stating that "drowning is the second leading cause of unin-



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tentional injury death in children aged one to fourteen years in the United States," and with the growing popularity of garden ponds, which are not regulated, the danger for local children is clear.

"Garden ponds are very attractive to children and without proper safety barriers they can be very dangerous," Amber wrote. "According to Berks County's zoning ordinance, the definition of a pond is 'any body of water used for the purposes of landscaping a property that has a water depth in any part of 24 inches or more.' That means that the average garden pond, which is usually only eighteen inches deep, requires no safety barriers to be installed."

In addition to her 15-page persuasive essay, Amber developed a how strong of a person she is." multi-genre project that illustrated her essay claims through diverse media, including a video she made herself, which included images of her niece's recovery.

"This has been my favorite assignment I have ever done," Amber wrote in a personal reflection for the multi-genre project. "I showed the video to my whole

family and we all cried together. It "I was thrilled to hear a student was the first time my niece saw any of these visuals of herself. I will be giving her a copy of the video to keep so she can look

pursued her research beyond the classroom," said Amber's instructor, Dr. Tamara Girardi. "The news story is very touching, but after working with Amber, that doesn't surprise me. From early in the semester, it was clear Amber was passionate about her work and this issue that has affected her family.

"The outcome is a perfect example of why I believe in challenging students to select topics that affect them and their communities. Amber learned the power of her own voice, and I know she and her family will continue raising awareness and sharing Allison's story."

Amber agreed, saying that she back at how far she has come and and her sister plan to start a web site and a Facebook page to educate the public about the lack of regulations for garden ponds. UItimately, she would like to see ordinances and laws changed to protect children and small animals.

> "This project was a lot of work but very rewarding," Amber said. "I feel like I learned and accomplished a lot."
