LPN Transitional Track students receive credits for NURS 140, 141 by providing current unencumbered PA practical nursing license.

Acceptance into the clinical component of the Associate Degree Nursing program as an LPN transitional track student is competitive and is based on published admission criteria and point system.

The student who enters the Associate Degree program as an LPN will have the opportunity to earn credit for Nursing 144, 150, 242, 243, and 244 by completing the Assessment Technology Inc. (ATI) Proctored Assessments and scoring at a passing level, as determined by the nursing department

- o Nursing 144 and Nursing 150 -ATI RN Fundamental
- Nursing 242: ATI RN Maternal Newborn
- Nursing 243: ATI RN Pediatric Nursing
- Nursing 244: ATI RN Mental Health

All prospective nursing students begin in the Allied Health major. When they fulfill the clinical application requirements (admission criteria including dates and deadlines for clinical application), they can apply for admission to either the Registered Nursing program or the Practical Nursing program. These admission criteria will be discussed during their advising sessions and during the nursing information sessions.

Among the criteria to be eligible to apply for clinicals:

- Earned a TEAS Version 7 score of **70** or higher (transfer students from another Nursing program may request to have this requirement waived). TEAS scores are valid for 3 years.
- If you completed at least ONE nursing course at another institution within the past 2 years (with no C-, D, F, W), please review the Nursing External Transfer Procedure (PDF)
- Have a documented high school diploma or GED or equivalent foreign education as verified by a HACC-approved credential
 evaluation service (REQUIRED FOR ALL STUDENTS even if you have a college degree)
- Will be at least 18 years of age by the cohort start-date
- Eligible to enroll in (or has completed) ENGL 101 by the first day of the first clinical term
- Eligible to enroll in MATH 103 or MATH 202 by the first day of the first clinical term
- Enrolled in or has completed (with a 'C' or better) BIOL 121* (Anatomy and Physiology I) by the first day of the first clinical term

Nursing (RN) Program Time Commitment – Comparison of 4-semester and 8-semester options Please note, students are admitted to a Cohort. Seats available in each Cohort vary. Admission is selective and NOT guaranteed.

Four-semester (previously called *full-time* or day) Option – Please note Day means that most hours occur during the day. Class will be offered during the day, however, some clinical hours can be scheduled during the evening. Offered on Gettysburg, Harrisburg, and Lancaster Campus

- 4-semester program courses are offered in 7-week "mini-mesters".
- Time commitments for nursing students will vary according to the campus and the semester.
 - O Class: 2 to 4 hours of theory two to three days each week
 - O Clinical or Clinical Lab experiences: 6 to 7 hours of clinical experiences, two days each week
 - In some cases, the clinical experiences will be scheduled during the day, as early as 6:30 am, or during the evening as late as 10:00 pm.
 - Nursing Simulation Lab practice is in addition to these experiences and will consume many additional hours each week.
 - For each hour in class, the student should expect to spend 3 hours outside of class for preparation, assignments, and study time.

Four-semester Weekend Option (Harrisburg Campus ONLY)— This program is designed for second degree students who have completed all of the general education requirements, for returning LPN's seeking to advance their degree who have completed most or all of the general education requirements or for any student who has completed most or all of the general education requirements.

- Time commitments for this option include:
 - Class: 8 am to 3 or 5 pm on Fridays in the fall and spring
 - Class: 8 am to 3 or 5 on Thursdays in the summer
 - o Clinical: Saturday **and/or** Sunday from 6:30 am to 3:30 or 5:30 pm.
 - Additionally, students in this program who have not completed all the general education requirements will need to take courses during the week.
 - Nursing Simulation Lab practice is in addition to these experiences and will consume many additional hours each week.
 - For each hour in class, the student should expect to spend 3 hours outside of class for preparation, assignments, and study time.

Eight-semester (previously called part-time or evening) **Option:** This program is designed for working students. To qualify for financial aid, students must take general education courses along with Nursing courses. This program will take 8 consecutive semesters (including summers) to complete as compared to 4-semesters in the traditional full-time program.

- Day/Evening #1: Classroom Theory
 - Currently all students in the program attend one lecture class together on their respective campuses:
 - One evening per week (Gettysburg, Harrisburg, Lancaster and York)
 - One day per week (York Campus ONLY)
 - Classes can start as early as 3 pm and run as late as 11 pm, depending on the Campus.
 - Nursing Simulation Lab practice is in addition to these experiences and will consume many additional hours each week.
 - For each hour in class, the student should expect to spend 3 hours outside of class for preparation, assignments, and study time.
- Day/Evening #2: Clinical
 - Currently all students in the program attend one clinical day per week.
 - The total Cohort group is divided into smaller groups for clinical.
 - Clinical groups have a max of 8 students to 1 instructor ratios.
 - Clinical can start as early as 3 pm and run as late as 11 pm. Times may vary slightly depending upon the clinical rotation and Campus.
 - This second evening is a combination of skill training which takes place on campus and clinical rotation.
- Summer Session:
 - O Summer is a 12-week semester, vs a 15-week semester.
 - Hours for summer semesters are 3 11 p.m
