1. Is it still important to self-screen daily?

Yes. Please continue to self-screen and assess how you feel each day.

If you feel sick or have any (*one or more*) cold, flu, Monkeypox or COVID-19 symptoms (*regardless of your vaccination status*), please:

- Stay home
- Notify your supervisor
- Monitor yourself for the next 48 hours
- Contact your physician and follow their guidance

2. I have a slight cough. Should I stay home?

Yes. Please stay home if you have one or more symptoms.

Coming to campus when you are sick puts your health in jeopardy and other employees and students at risk. We are not serving our students well if an entire department is out sick or if we make them sick.

Please note that the College is asking that you <u>self-screen</u> each day, not self-diagnose. Self-screening is a way for you to inventory how you feel and ensure you have no symptoms. However, *only a medical professional* can diagnose your symptoms and medical condition. Therefore, please do not assume that you only have allergies and come to campus.

Please note:

- If you have an absence that is related to a serious health condition and results in an absence of three or more work days, please review the <u>Family and Medical</u> <u>Leave Act (FMLA) information page</u> for eligibility criteria and to submit an FMLA request. You can find additional information in <u>SGP 822 Family and</u> <u>Medical Leave Act (FMLA) Policy</u>.
- 2. The College's liberal leave policy is in effect through Dec. 31, 2022, and allows eligible employees to use personal, sick or vacation time for any reason. If you are eligible, please request time off and receive approval from your supervisor and code your timesheet accordingly. If you have questions about eligibility, please contact your supervisor.
- 3. If an illness causes a student to be absent for an extended amount of time, <u>Student Access Services (SAS)</u> can help them.
- 4. We must continue to provide ourselves, each other and our students with grace regarding deadlines, attendance and assignments (when possible).

3. I understand the liberal leave policy is ending on Dec. 31, 2022. I am new at HACC and not sure what it is. Can you explain the liberal leave policy and how it can be used?

The College's liberal leave policy allows eligible employees to use personal, sick or vacation time for any reason. Employees must request time off and receive approval from their supervisor. Employees should code their timesheets accordingly.

4. What is the KEYS Program?

The Keystone Education Yields Success (KEYS) Program assists students who receive

Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) and Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits. Students access a range of services through the KEYS Program. The program is based on human-centered design and includes a combination of case management, coaching and peer-to-peer experiences to develop a career pathway through upskilling, certificate and/or associate degree completion.
